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AGENCY’S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

One area that is forever changed as a result of the pandemic is public education. The most recent release of test scores results from the 2022-23 school year shows that South Carolina students continue on the road to recovery, having continued the rebound to pre-pandemic levels in English Language Arts (ELA). The percentage of students scoring *Meets* or *Exceeds* in SC READY ELA has surpassed the pre-pandemic levels of proficiency in every grade level.

Achievement and growth scores in math and science are concerning. Just over a quarter of students in grades 3-8 identified as Pupils in Poverty (PIP) are meeting standards in math. Almost 40 percent of eighth graders scored *Does Not Meet* on the mathematics portion of SC READY, indicating that they are two grade levels behind their peers meeting standard. Students of color and students who live in homes that lack financial resources fare even worse. We acknowledge that many students and families are struggling; equipping schools to make informed decisions will assist in continuous improvement and lead to better student outcomes. The children are our inspiration to do the work we do – we believe in their potential, and we want every child to have the opportunity to succeed. Our goal is to provide an environment where there are no barriers to any child’s success and opportunities exist for every student to achieve college and career success.

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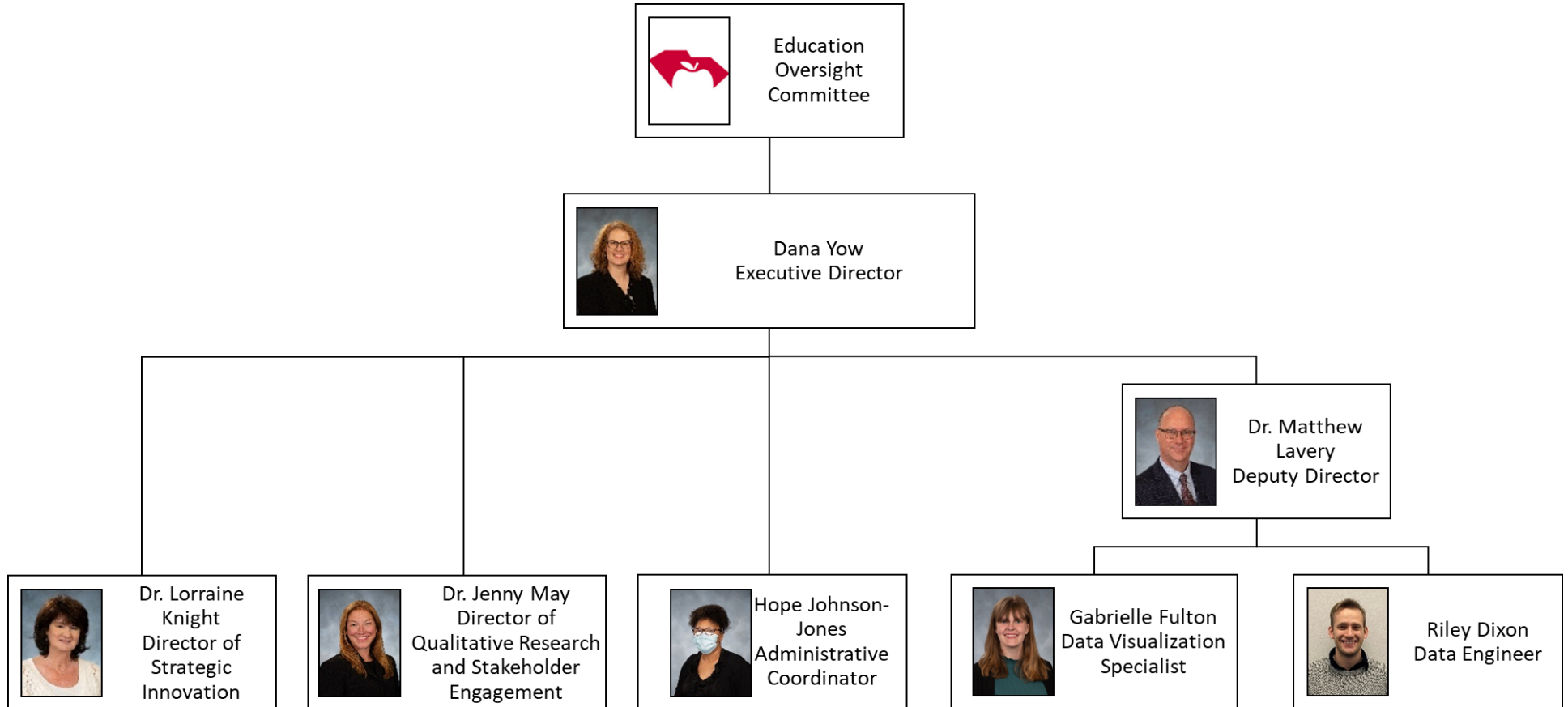
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AGENCY ORGANIZATIONAL CHART
